This information pertains to one of the JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), which shall be implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

'JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)' as a New Start

In the Development Cooperation Charter which was released from the Japanese Cabinet on February 2015, it is clearly pointed out that "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." We believe that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a center of mutual learning process.

I. Concept

Background

International and trans-border crimes have been increasing and it is internationally recognized that for preventing crimes and keeping security in each country, it is becoming more important to form common understanding on concerned ordinances for international criminal investigation and to strengthen the ties of mutual international police cooperation. This program is designed to contribute to make this common understanding and strengthen international police cooperation, and has been conducted for several decades.

For what?

This program firstly aims at providing an opportunity to identify the problems/challenges that the police organizations of participating countries are facing in the field of international criminal investigation and to observe how Japanese Police have worked in this field through a case study. This opportunity ultimately makes it possible for participants to consider how to change and improve their police activities for international criminal investigations and crime prevention, and to strengthen the ties of mutual international cooperation.

For whom?

This program is offered to the central police agency of participating countries, and especially for middle ranking officials in charge of international criminal investigation or Mutual Legal Assistance in criminal matters. (see III-2 Nominee Qualifications)

How?

Participants shall have opportunities to learn about the Japanese police force, including its organization, criminal investigative proceedings and activities for international criminal investigations. Participants will also have a site visit to observe activities of a prefectural police. Additionally, participants will have time to discuss their common challenges with other participants through the program. This makes them to identify challenges that their countries are facing in the field of international criminal investigation and to consider their activities to work on the challenges. At the end of the seminar, participants will make an action plan for solving the challenges and issues they are facing in international criminal investigation incorporating whatever lessons they have learned in Japan.

7. Course Objective:

Participants identify the issues/points to be improved for better operation in international criminal investigation and investigative method in their country through acquiring knowledge on Japanese police system/organization and international criminal investigative activities.

III. Conditions and Procedures for Application

1. Expectations for the Participating Organizations:

- (1) This program is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operations. Applying organizations are expected to use the program for those specific purposes.
- (2) In this connection, applying organizations are expected to nominate the most qualified candidates to address the said issues or problems, carefully referring to the qualifications described in section III-2 below.
- (3) Applying organizations are also expected to be prepared to make use of knowledge acquired by the nominees for the said purpose.
- (4) Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment: Women are encouraged to apply for the program. JICA is committed to promoting gender equality and women's empowerment and provides equal opportunities for all applicants regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

2. Nominee Qualifications:

Applying Organizations are expected to select nominee(s) who meet the following qualifications.

(1) Current Duties:

be an individual in charge of international criminal investigation or International Mutual Legal Assistance in criminal matters in the central police organization (excluding counterterrorism section),

(2) Rank:

In principle, be Chief Inspector (be equivalent to Captain of the Army) or in a higher position,

(3) Age:

be aged between 35 to 45 in principle,

(4) Experience in the relevant field:

have a 3-year or more career in the field of International Criminal Investigation or of International Mutual Legal Assistance in criminal matters,

(5) Nomination:

be nominated by their government in accordance with the procedure mentioned in III-3 below,

Not have participated in the same kind of seminar/course hosted by either National Police Agency of Japan or JICA in the past,

(6) Language:

have a sufficient command of English in speaking and writing,

(7) Health:

must be in good health to participate in the program in Japan. To reduce the risk of worsening symptoms associated with respiratory tract infection, please

honest to declare in the Medical History (QUESTIONNAIRE ON MEDICAL STATUS RESTRICTION of the application form) if you have been a patient of following illnesses; Hypertension / Diabetes / Cardiovascular illness / Heart failure / Chronic respiratory illness.

3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) Application Form: The Application Form is available at the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan).
- (2) Photocopy of passport: to be submitted with the application form, if you process your passport which you will carry when entering Japan for this program. If not, you are requested to submit its photocopy as soon as you obtain it.
 - *Photocopy should include the followings:

 Name, Date of birth, Nationality, Sex, Passport number and Expire date.
- (3) ANNEX: Attach ANNEX which specifies your police rank (if not, military rank) and position (including bureau, department and section in your organization). Both should be typewritten and the latter should be attached to the former on application. Please be noted that this ANNEX is subject to consideration for the selection of participants. (Note: Applicant's position / responsibility must be clearly described for selection purposes.)
- (4) Chart of the Organization and the Police rank system: Attach the chart of the organization which you belong to, and describe the rank system in your organization, both of which are also subject to selection.

[Note] Please mark the applicant's position on the chart.

4. Procedure for Application and Selection:

(1) Submission of the Application Documents:

Closing date for applications: Please inquire to the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan).

*After receiving applications, the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) will send them to **the JICA Center in JAPAN** by **December 11, 2023**

(2) Selection:

After receiving the documents through proper channels from your government, the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) will conduct screenings, and then forward the documents to JICA TOKYO in Japan. Selection will be made by JICA TOKYO in consultation with the National Police Agency of Japan. The applying organization with the best intention to utilize the opportunity of this program will be highly valued in the selection.

Qualifications of applicants who belong to the military or other military-related

organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military will be examined by the Government of Japan on a case-by-case basis, consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan, taking into consideration their duties, positions in the organization, and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner.

(3) Notice of Acceptance:

Notification of results will be made by the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan) **not later than** December 22, 2023

5. Additional Document(s) to Be Submitted by Accepted Candidates:

Country Report -- to be submitted by January 20, 2024

<u>Accepted participants</u> are required to prepare "Country Report" based on latest information on the police organization, its systems and especially the problems/ challenges which the police of participating countries confront. <u>A format for "Country Report" and an instruction about the report formulation will be sent to the accepted candidates at the same time with the acceptance letter.</u>

Conditions for Participation

The participants of KCCP are required

- (1) to strictly observe the course schedule,
- (2) not to change the air ticket (and flight class and flight schedule arranged by JICA) and lodging by the participants themselves,
- (3) to understand that leaving Japan during the course period (to return to home country, etc.) is not allowed (except for programs longer than one year),
- (4) not to bring or invite any family members (except for programs longer than one year),
- (5) to carry out such instructions and abide by such conditions as may be stipulated by both the nominating Government and the Japanese Government in respect of the course.
- **(6)** to observe the rules and regulations of the program implementing partners to provide the program or establishments,
- (7) not to engage in political activities, or any form of employment for profit,
- (8) to discontinue the program, should the participants violate the Japanese laws or JICA's regulations, or the participants commit illegal or immoral conduct, or get critical illness or serious injury and be considered unable to continue the course. The participants shall be responsible for paying any cost for treatment of the said health conditions except for the medical care stipulated in (3) of "5. Expenses", "IV. Administrative Arrangements",
- (9) to return the total amount or a part of the expenditure for the KCCP depending on the severity of such violation, should the participants violate the laws and ordinances.

- (10) not to drive a car or motorbike, regardless of an international driving license possessed
- (11) to observe the rules and regulations at the place of the participants' accommodation, and to refund allowances or other benefits paid by JICA in the case of a change in schedule.

- (3) Medical care for participants who become ill after arriving in Japan (the costs related to pre-existing illness, pregnancy, or dental treatment are <u>not</u> included).

- 2. The participants who have successfully completed the seminar will be awarded certificates by JICA and National Police Agency (NPA).
- **3.** The participants are requested to bring a copy of each country's newest domestic laws related to the following matters:
 - International investigative assistance;
 - Criminal Procedure
- 4. Dress code policy: The participants are requested to wear a suit and tie or other formal wear at the seminar. (No jeans or T-shirts will be allowed.) Unless there is any restriction within their police organizations, the participants are encouraged to bring their police uniforms (forage cap acceptable) to Japan for such functions as the opening ceremony, courtesy call to Police Chiefs and receptions.

JICA and Capacity Development

The key concept underpinning JICA operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that "capacity development" is central to the socioeconomic development of any country, regardless of the specific operational scheme one may be undertaking, i.e. expert assignments, development projects, development study projects, training programs, JOCV programs, etc.

Within this wide range of programs, Training Programs have long occupied an important place in JICA operations. Conducted in Japan, they provide partner countries with opportunities to acquire practical knowledge accumulated in Japanese society. Participants dispatched by partner countries might find useful knowledge and re-create their own knowledge for enhancement of their own capacity or that of the organization and society to which they belong.

About 460 pre-organized programs cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs are being customized to address the specific needs of different target organizations, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan was the first non-Western country to successfully modernize its society and industrialize its economy. At the core of this process, which started more than 140 years ago, was the "adopt and adapt" concept by which a wide range of appropriate skills and knowledge have been imported from developed countries; these skills and knowledge have been adapted and/or improved using local skills, knowledge and initiatives. They finally became internalized in Japanese society to suit its local needs and conditions.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from this "adoption and adaptation" process, which, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories. We presume that such experiences, both successful and unsuccessful, will be useful to our partners who are trying to address the challenges currently faced by developing countries.

However, it is rather challenging to share with our partners this whole body of Japan's developmental experience. This difficulty has to do, in part, with the challenge of explaining a body of "tacit knowledge," a type of knowledge that cannot fully be expressed in words or numbers. Adding to this difficulty are the social and cultural systems of Japan that vastly differ from those of other Western industrialized countries, and hence still remain unfamiliar to many partner countries. Simply stated, coming to Japan might be one way of overcoming such a cultural gap.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
